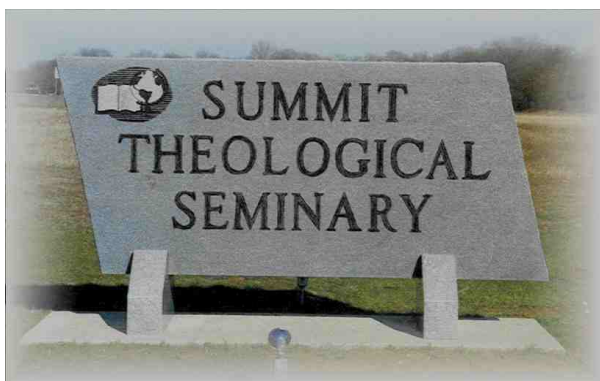

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ABOUT THE FOUNDER OF SUMMIT

George L. Faull, Rel. D.



Brother Faull attended the following schools: Lexington Christian Bible College Lexington, KY ('58-'60); St. Louis Christian College, Florissant, MO ('60-'61); and Midwestern School of Evangelism, Ottumwa, IA ('61-'62). From the latter institution, he earned the Bachelor of Sacred Literature.

From '62 to '66, he planted new churches in Massachusetts, Vermont, and Maine. In 1970, he received his Bachelor of Theology and, in 1972, his Master of Arts in Theology both from Indiana Christian University of Indianapolis, IN, while preaching in Michigan City, Indiana.

Mr. Faull did further work at Cincinnati Bible Seminary - Cincinnati, OH, ('75-'76), and Huntington Christian Seminary – Huntington, IN ('78) which was transferred to Indiana Christian University - Indianapolis, IN to earn his Doctorate in Religion in 1981. In addition, he held ministries in Treaty, Woodburn, Fort Wayne, and Peru, IN. While preaching at Treaty, he founded Treaty Institute for Evangelism. It was a correspondence school that grew to 12,000 students in 4 years. It has since had over 100,000 students. It is now called American Bible Academy in Joplin, MO. It is the largest correspondence school in the Christian Churches/Churches of Christ.

In 1980, Brother Faull moved to Woodburn, IN and started Seminary Off-campus Studies. In 1984, the school was incorporated and named, Summit Theological Seminary, due to its location then being One Summit Square in Fort Wayne, IN. Later, the college was relocated to Peru, IN. Originally, Summit was designed as a college which provided independent study courses but added a residency program in 2012.

Brother Faull had articles published in sixteen religious journals. He was a frequent speaker at many family camps, men's retreats, and revivals. He preached in over 190 different churches in Indiana alone and in forty-two states. He had taught college courses in residence each year since 1969.

Brother Faull passed away at his residence on Wednesday, February 24, 2021. Although he is not with us physically, we will continue to use his lectures and material for coursework and studies.

He has taught Bible courses in three different countries including Kenya and Jamaica. Terry also travels for seminars, revivals, camps, and pulpit fill-in. Terry has written articles for multiple brotherhood journals as well as several books on a variety of Biblical topics.

Outside of the ministry, Terry has traveled extensively as a software engineer. He has taught mathematics at the university level and has had original research published in a peer-reviewed mathematical journal.

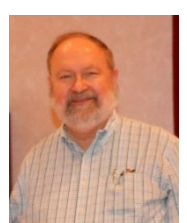

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW:

- * Summit Theological Seminary is not accredited by any accrediting institution.
- * Only 10% of the degree program can be earned by life experience.
- * You may use a qualified instructor with our approval for a course in your program. He must hold a degree equal to or higher than the one you are pursuing.
- * Currently 100% of our instructors graduated from schools other than Summit Theological Seminary.
- * 95% of the lecturers highest degrees were received from regionally accredited schools.
- * We are not affiliated in any way with any other institution of higher learning.
- * Students who are seeking ordination in mainline denominations, to become a chaplain in the Armed Services, to teach at the college level in accredited institutions are not encouraged to enroll in our programs because such institutions require accreditation.
- * Bible colleges accredited with AABC may not accept our undergraduate credits.



ABOUT SUMMIT THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Established in 1984, Summit has celebrated its 41st anniversary! Summit is an unaccredited school and has never applied to any accrediting association. However, we do accept credits from schools that we recognize.

Summit Theological Seminary exists for the specific purpose of teaching the Bible, Bible related issues, and practical ministry courses. Though it is not confined to those who are ministers of the Gospel, it was established for the purpose of recruiting and educating men for the ministry. We encourage located ministers to finish their degree program or to continue their education at a graduate level.

Summit Theological Seminary awards degrees in Theology and Bible. Our degrees are not designed to have any value in the secular marketplace, but only in the Church and Her educational institutions.

Although it is not mandatory, we prefer that our students to be teaching in some capacity in the local church while attending Summit Theological Seminary. We feel that this is advantageous to the student for both his learning and communication skills. We feel this also demonstrates the confidence that his local congregation has in him as a committed believer, possessing the ability and desire to know and “Teach God’s Word to God’s World.”

How are we unique?

- * We do not offer liberal arts education. We do require a basic core of liberal arts for the bachelor’s degree. Many of these credits can be taken at Summit while other credits can be transferred from other schools that we recognize.
- * We do not have either a music or athletic department. However, some such courses from other schools may be used as electives.
- * We will not solicit money for its operation. The school will be funded by its tuition and unsolicited gifts from those who believe in what we are attempting to do.
- * We encourage the student to be teaching in some capacity while he is enrolled. We agree with Seneca who said, “Men learn while they teach.”
- * We do not require our students to take resident courses. Although some may take residence study, others may choose to learn by means of online courses or independent study. Francis Bacon said, “*Reading maketh a full man, conference a ready man, and writing an exact man.*”

Summit Theological Seminary does not exist to tell men “How the heavens go”. It is designed to prepare its students to tell men “How to go to Heaven”. It does not deal with the “age of rocks”, it deals with the “Rock of Ages”. It does not strive to equip men in the “ways of the evil world”, but in how to help men overcome the “evil of the world’s way”.

Summit Theological Seminary exists for one purpose: to prepare men and women to be “**Teaching God’s Word to God’s World**”. Our degrees simply state that our students have prepared themselves for this important task.

WHO ATTENDS SUMMIT THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY?

Traditional students who come to us straight from high school.

- Transfer students from other colleges.
- Those in located ministry who complete their degree without relocating.
- Those who are converted later in life and want to be trained in Bible and ministry.



The majority of our students are involved in ministry while pursuing their degree.

WHAT IS A NON-RESIDENT DEGREE?

A non-resident degree program does not require attendance in a traditional college classroom. This is a very practical and far less expensive means of education.

The Bible, theology, education, religion, and Biblical counseling are subjects that can be learned by non-resident methods. These subjects lend themselves to this type of educational approach—the reading of books, listening to lectures, and viewing videos make these subjects easy to grasp by the adult student. A thesis, project, or original research demonstrates the student's comprehension and expertise.

Non-resident degree programs are not correspondence courses, although a few correspondence courses may be accepted toward the degree. **There is a vast difference between correspondence courses and independent guided study.**

Correspondence Courses are usually several lessons in length, requiring “fill-in-the-blank” type questions, a short-term paper, and a final supervised exam. There are fully accredited colleges that offer correspondence courses in dozens of fields. Summit Theological Seminary may make use of these schools in assigning courses to students in the area of liberal arts.

Independent Study requires a bibliography, independent research, assigned reading, viewing and listening to lectures, as well as originality in producing projects that demonstrate competency in the chosen area of study. Initially non-resident degree programs were primarily done through mail. Materials were sent to the student who then studied them, did the required research, wrote papers, and took exams. Summit Theological Seminary has offered the traditional independent studies via the mail since it was founded in 1984. We still offer this method and will continue to do so. In 2022, we began offering a live online option for the full schedule of resident classes each semester. For all our courses, we use highly qualified, biblically solid professors.

Summit Theological Seminary makes no attempt to be politically correct, but rather doctrinally true to the Scriptures.

FIRST TIME ENROLLEES

New students enrolling at Summit for the first time will be charged a \$30.00 one-time enrollment fee which should be submitted with your completed Application of Admissions Form and a current photo.

Potential students can review our degree programs to determine which option is best for them.



Summit offers independent and online options for students who cannot attend the classes in person but are able to study from their own homes.

You may attend our live classes on campus (when available) or online. Audit students are welcome to attend classes for free. Our class material is offered to audit students for purchase, as well.

Ways to Earn Credits Toward Your Degree

In-person or Online Classes

The rule of thumb is fifteen hours of classroom per semester hour. This does not include outside assignments. Each semester, courses are taught by experienced preachers to help men structure and understand the aspects of “Teaching God’s Word to God’s World”. Women are welcome in all but the Homiletics and Leadership courses. Check out the current schedule online.



Seminar Attendance

Seminars conducted by the faculty require ten hours of instruction per semester hour and completion of the course assignments. In some cases, seminars offered by other colleges may also be used to fulfill the students’ competency. Approval from the Academic Dean is needed before other schools’ credits are granted toward a degree.

Equivalency Exams

These exams will cover the field of study in which the student feels that he is already qualified. These are one to four-hour exams. Credit is awarded upon the successful completion of the exams. CLEP exams will also be accepted by the school in particular areas of study.

Life Experience

The credit granted for life experience will be based upon the experience the student has had in a particular field of study. These must be supported by credentials and will be included in your portfolio. The number of hours are limited to 10% of the degree’s requirements.

Correspondence Courses

Credits will be accepted from sources recognized by this school. Summit Theological Seminary may recommend liberal arts courses from one of the fully accredited schools that offer correspondence courses for credit.

Travel

The school will grant up to six credit hours for those who submit an acceptable paper on their visit to Palestine under a Summit Theological Seminary approved instructor.

Independent Study

This requires that the student work with his faculty adviser in designing the learning program. This can be met by following a prescribed system of study or by taking classes from another institution of learning.

Thesis

This may be required for the degree in which the student is enrolled. The school will not grant over six hours for this research paper. This must be bound and approved before credit is granted.

Internship

Students who desire to earn credit for internships must submit an application stating their desire to do so. Summit Theological Seminary will work with the leadership of the sponsoring church in developing a constructive program for the student. Credits will be decided by a student adviser.

Transfer

We accept credits earned from other schools that we recognize.

INDEPENDENT STUDY PROGRAM

We know how busy life can be. We desire everyone to benefit from our classes and material. This program was created so that students can enroll and receive their coursework to complete in the comfort and privacy of their own home at their own pace.

The course materials and instructions are sent for you to follow. Each student is responsible for structuring their own personal time to devote toward their classwork. Completed work is sent to Summit where it is reviewed, graded, logged into your student file, and returned to the student.

Mid-term and/or final tests are sent in a sealed envelope to be opened by a proctor who oversees your testing on our behalf. Most tests are closed book/Bible, unless otherwise stated. Your proctor (a trusted adult eighteen years or older) will sign the completed test where indicated. You then return your test to Summit to be reviewed and graded. All graded tests and all coursework are returned to the student.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is a Proctor?

An adult, eighteen years or older, who supervises and witnesses a student's exam. The proctor must be present during the entire test and should sign an acknowledgement of witnessing the testing upon completion. They should be able to give an honest account for the student's test. Students who are taking the same course or program cannot proctor each other's exams.

What is a Thesis?

Definition of a Thesis: An essay, usually of book length, that represents original research written as a requirement for a degree (usually a master's degree). Normally, the student takes a specific position and presents evidence and arguments for that position in their thesis.

What is Plagiarism?

Definition of Plagiarism: Plagiarism is defined as presenting somebody else's work as your own. This can take more than one form. To quote an author directly without proper citation is plagiarism. A paper that is merely a compilation of quotes from others is not acceptable when an original paper has been assigned. Furthermore, quotes must be limited in length, even if properly cited. A four to six-page paper may not include a quotation that is several paragraphs or pages long.

What about the Closed Book Tests/Exams?

Any test Summit sends out stating it is a "closed book/Bible" test or exam is sent in a sealed envelope to be opened by your designated proctor. The test is to be taken in one sitting... meaning that you cannot leave the test and return later to resume. No Bible is to be used nor any notes or textbooks during the course unless specifically stated.

The test/exam is to be completed; your proctor is to sign and/or date in the designated area on the test then mail it back to Summit for grading. Any questions regarding the taking of your test/exam should be directed to Summit.

COSTS AND PAYMENT INFORMATION

Independent Study Costs

Summit Theological Seminary charges \$30.00 per credit hour for undergraduate work and \$50.00 per credit hour for graduate work. Course materials are in addition to tuition cost, as they vary per course. **There is a one-time, non-refundable \$30.00 enrollment fee.** If at least one course is not completed within one year, a new enrollment fee of \$30.00 is required. For the entire program, master's degree tuition costs \$1,800.00.

Resident and Online Study Costs and Information

Summit Theological Seminary charges \$60.00 per credit hour for all online and resident courses. **There is a one-time, non-refundable \$30.00 enrollment fee.**

Resident and online classes are held Tuesday through Thursday each semester. This schedule allows time for sermon preparation and travel for active preachers.

The current class schedule and registration form can be found on our website.

Payment Information

Students may pay via cash, check, or credit card. We accept MasterCard, Visa, and Discover. Students may pay via credit card over the phone by supplying us with their name on the account, card number, expiration date, and security code. Students may also pay via credit card at www.summit1.org by selecting the **Make A Payment** tab and following the prompts.

The student may arrange to make monthly payments. Students have one month in which to make a minimum payment of **\$50.00 on bills totaling over \$500.00 and \$25.00 on bills totaling less than \$500.00.** Should an account become thirty days delinquent, a \$10.00 penalty fee will be added to his account each month thereafter, unless written arrangements are made. **No degree will be granted or credits transferred until the bill is paid in full.** The student has ten days after enrollment to withdraw from their program after which no refund will be given.

then the Diploma of Biblical Studies may be for you. This program is designed to build a solid Biblical foundation. These courses can be taken as independent study for credit, or they can be used as a guide to improve your Bible knowledge. These courses are good for individual study as well as group study.

What Courses are Included?

The following six courses, 135 lessons, make up the **Diploma of Biblical Studies** program.

002 AN INTRODUCTORY PICTORIAL SURVEY OF THE BIBLE

Includes five Booklets (Jule Miller Visual Bible Series) which gives a pictorial overview of the Bible and Church History.

101 BIBLE DOCTRINE SURVEY

This is a survey of the Bible called, “**The Unfolded Plan of God**”. It includes a textbook and a workbook consisting of fifty-two lessons.

106 ELEMENTARY SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY

This includes a textbook and a workbook called “**The 52 Simple Stimulating Studies**” which contains fifty-two lessons.

001 BIBLE GEOGRAPHY

This is a geographical survey of the Bible and consists of twenty-six lessons covered in two workbooks: Old Testament and New Testament.

117 BIBLE SURVEY – The Eternal Struggle

A unique in-depth study of the scheme of redemption from **Genesis** to **Revelation**. This course shows the attempts of Satan to prevent the Messiah’s coming to be the Savior of the world. No other seminary or college has this unique study which has been over thirty years in the making. Includes the Eternal Struggle textbook, lectures, workbook, and sixty professionally recorded Bible stories called, “Your Story Hour: Bible Comes Alive”.

003 THIRTEEN COMPREHENSIVE BIBLE TESTS

These review tests cover general Bible knowledge and are given to complete the D.B.S. Program.

How Much Does the Program Cost?

The total cost of this entire program, including registration fee (\$30.00), is \$850.00. **Neither the registration fee nor the cost of the materials will be refunded if the applicant later drops out of the program.** This means that the student should not enter this program unless they are sure that they desire to complete it.

Each of these courses are available as individual courses, and if the student fears that they may not complete all six courses in this program, they should enroll in it one course at a time. Students awarded the **Diploma of Biblical Studies** will be granted 16 undergraduate hours of college credit.

If the student chooses to pay in installments, this program will cost a total of \$850.00, plus shipping. If you pay for the program in full, it will only cost you a total of \$800.00, shipping included. If you audit this program, the total cost is \$480.00 for the materials.

COURSES OFFERED

BIBLICALLY RELATED

101 Bible Doctrine Survey (The Unfolded Plan of God)**3 credit hours**

This course takes the student through elementary doctrine of both **Testaments**.

103 Hermeneutics**3 credit hours**

The study of the interpretation of **Scriptures** relative to the figures of speech used in Scripture. The course helps the student interpret and harmonize difficult passages.

115 Christian Ethics**3 credit hours**

A survey on how to determine right from wrong by means of the voice within (conscience), the voice without (history) and the voice from above (revelation).

117 Bible Survey – The Eternal Struggle (In-Depth)**3 credit hours**

This is an overview of the scheme of redemption from **Genesis to Revelation**. The course will show the attempts of Satan to prevent Messiah's coming to be the Savior of the world.

118 (Insights into) Bible Customs**3 credit hours**

This course deals with the peculiar customs and habits of life of those living in the **Bible** lands. These customs will make the **Bible** come alive for you.

271 Servanthood Ethics**2 credit hours**

This is a verse-by-verse concept by concept study of the Sermon on the Mount, built on application of the Beatitudes.

324 Social Ethics**3 credit hours**

This is a study of the social problems of today. They include drinking, Masonry, instrumental music, divorce, gambling, make-up, etc.

404 Typology**3 credit hours**

This is a study of the major types in Scripture, and their value and usefulness. The dangers of carrying the types too far will be stressed and examples from Ante-Nicene Fathers and Jewish commentators will be given.

216 The Ten Commandments**1 credit hour**

The Ten Commandments in the Life of Today's Christian. This study discusses how the Ten Commandments are related to Christianity today.

337 The World of the New Testament**2 credit hours**

This course explores the timeframe from 63 BC through AD 98 to help understand the 1st Century world and 1st Century Jews. Major events, people, places, and dates for the time between the Testaments are also reviewed.

BIBLE BOOKS - GENESIS TO REVELATION

206 Genesis

3 credit hours

This is the book of beginnings, of firsts, which lays the groundwork for every other book in the Bible and answers many important Bible questions. Creation vs evolution, Beginnings of the scheme of redemption, Patriarchs' life reviewed, Theology of the patriarchs to Joseph, Laws and customs of the period involved.

207-E Exodus

2 credit hours

This class will guide the student in understanding the themes and major teaching of the book of Exodus.

212 Why God Gave the Law

3 credit hours

This gives a clearer plan or understanding of why God gave the law. It clarifies why He gave the special requirements that He did, and the consequences if they were not carried out.

208-A Joshua

3 credit hours

This gives in detail the possession of the land of Canaan, its trials, its challenges, and its victories. A contrast of Joshua and the Book of Acts will be noted.

208-B Judges/Ruth

3 credit hours

This will cover the customs of the times, and the six cycles consisting of "Sin, Suffering, Supplication, and Salvation" will be reviewed. **Ruth** will be studied for its typical significance. The lesson, **"Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit saith the Lord,"** will be stressed.

209-A I Samuel

3 credit hours

This gives the rise and fall of King Saul, along with the beginning of King David's reign. This course will draw out many moral lessons applicable today with the main emphasis placed on leadership ability and their ability to lead men to or away from God. Also, the influence of the prophets will be seen.

209-B II Samuel

3 credit hours

This will challenge one with the strengths and weaknesses of King David and his son, King Solomon, and the ways these factors affected Israel.

209-D I Chronicles

2 credit hours

This is a verse-by-verse study of I Chronicles.

301-E Nehemiah, the Problem-Solving Leader

2 credit hours

This course will make one aware of the restoration of Israel from the Babylonian captivity during the time that the walls were being rebuilt under Nehemiah's leadership.

303-C Solomon Literature

3 credit hours

Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon will be considered devotionally. **Proverbs** will be studied by subjects rather than verse-by-verse. The allegory of the **Song of Solomon** will be explored. The perversion of the use of **Ecclesiastes** will be exposed. Internal evidence of inspiration helps to make these books of great value.

303-D Proverbs

3 credit hours

Practical instructions for a believer under both testaments. This is a chapter-by-chapter study of the writings of a man God endowed with wisdom. One of the finest studies Summit offers.

301-A Isaiah

4 credit hours

This will be covered verse-by-verse:

- * Showing the times and situations of Isaiah's day.
- * Through this prophet's messianic prophecies, clear glimpses of the coming Savior are portrayed.
- * Problem passages will be handled.

BIBLE BOOKS – GENESIS TO REVELATION

301-B Jeremiah Literature

3 credit hours

A verse-by-verse study of the “weeping prophet” covers the **Book of Jeremiah** and **Lamentations**.

301-C Ezekiel

3 credit hours

This verse-by-verse study of the book covers the prophetic visions and the struggles of **Ezekiel**.

301 Daniel

3 credit hours

This covers the life of **Daniel**.

- * But even more exciting, the historical section of the book will show those being taken into Babylonian captivity.
- * The faith and dedication to the God of Israel is so powerfully witnessed in the life of this man.
- * His visions and interpreting of dreams present very interesting prophecies.

333 Jonah

1 credit hour

“**Melting the Hard Heart Within You**”. Looking at word, background, and commentary studies. We will find fun Biblical and life applications that we can use day to day. We will also deal with many (so-called) hard problems of this book.

302 Minor Prophets

4 credit hours

The books of **Hosea** through **Malachi** are covered in this study.

- * The historic setting will be noted for each of these twelve books.
- * The Messianic prophecies will be studied, and no dogmatic position will be declared relative to the millennium.

126-D Life of Christ # 4 – The Parables of Jesus

3 credit hours

This is a detailed study of each of the parables of Jesus with fresh insights. Many of the **Parables** do not teach what many previously understood.

126-E Life of Christ # 5 – The Miracles of Christ

3 credit hours

This covers a detailed study of each of the miracles of Jesus.

126-F Life of Christ # 6 – The Claims of Jesus

3 credit hours

Almost 2,000 years ago a man appeared on the pages of history. He made several claims about Himself that still makes Him a unique person. In light of the fact:

- * We date our calendar from His birth.
- * We have national holidays in His honor.
- * His Church has endured the centuries.
- * More people meet to honor Him on any given Sunday than all sports activities in a year.
- * We need to decide if His claims are valid.

126-G Life of Christ # 7 – The Frustrations of Jesus

1 credit hour

This course covers the frustrations:

- * Which Jesus Christ went through, Himself.
- * That He struggled with.

He shows us how to handle them, how to live with them and that He is our Master Example.

126-H Life of Christ #8 - Matthew 24 Important Key to Understanding Bible Prophecy

1 credit hour

This course covers the 24th chapter to explain the questions many ask about the End Times.

126-I Life of Christ #9–The Servanthood of Jesus

1 credit hour

This course gives a closer look at the Beatitudes and how each will show servanthood more perfectly.

126-J Life of Christ #10 – Prophecies Jesus Made

2 credit hours

This course will surprise you and develops a theme that few have written upon. It is a study of the prophecies Jesus made Himself, not the prophecies He fulfilled.

126-K Life of Christ #11 – The Commands of Jesus

2 credit hours

This course goes through the Gospels showing the commands Jesus gave to individuals, specific groups, or to know which apply to us today.

BIBLE BOOKS - GENESIS TO REVELATION

128 The Life & Ministry of John the Baptist

1 credit hour

This course shows the ministry of John the Baptist.

108 New Testament History

3 credit hours

This covers an in-depth study of the **Book of Acts**, chapter by chapter.

- * Work of the ascended Christ by His Spirit is shown.
- * A study of the conversions
- * Concentration on Church government
- * The zeal of the first Christians will be analyzed.

308-A Romans Chapters 1-8

3 credit hours

These chapters give a verse-by-verse study as a part of the Pauline Literature, which will show the remaining studies of Romans.

308-AB Romans Chapters 9-16

3 credit hours

These chapters give a verse-by-verse study as a part of the Pauline Literature, which will show the remaining studies of Romans.

309-A I Corinthians

3 credit hours

This book, in its verse-by-verse study, answers questions relevant to today, and will be studied from a practical standpoint. Such subjects discussed will be Denominationalism, Tongues, The Lord's Supper, Church cooperation, Women's place in the Church, Marriage, and Love.

309-B II Corinthians

2 credit hours

This book is not a verse-by-verse commentary. Rather it is a section-by-section look at the book of **II Corinthians**. This book contains lessons on each section of the book. It is meant to complement a verse-by-verse commentary.

308-B Galatians

2 credit hours

Understanding Galatians. This is a verse-by-verse study, which thoroughly covers the topic of **salvation by grace**.

310-A Ephesians

3 credit hours

This is a verse-by-verse study course.

310-B Philippians

2 credit hours

This covers verse-by-verse a powerful revealing of Paul's message of how we can Glorify God.

310-C Colossians

3 credit hours

A verse-by-verse study to "**Know the Mystery of God**".

316 I & II Thessalonians

2 credit hours

A verse-by-verse study on Paul's letters to the church at Thessalonica. Areas of studies include the man of sin, the great apostasy, the restrainer, the rapture, and others.

311 Evangelist Epistles

3 credit hours

I & II Timothy and Titus were written to the evangelists, not pastor-elders. This will be studied to show a preacher's responsibility to those within and without the Church.

312 Hebrews

3 credit hours

It stresses the superiority of Christ to the Prophets, angels, Moses, Joshua, Aaron, and his priesthood, etc. It also shows that there are better promises, covenants and hopes. This is a verse-by-verse study.

314 James

2 credit hours

This is a verse-by-verse study stressing:

- * Righteous and holy living
- * Faithfulness in life and doctrine

314-A I & II Peter

3 credit hours

This is a verse-by-verse study stressing the living hope and sure salvation.

BIBLE BOOKS - GENESIS TO REVELATION

313 Johannian Literature

3 credit hours

This covers **I, II and III John**. These epistles, contrasted to the **Gospel of John**, will deal with: Love, Obedience, Knowing one's salvation, Dangers of false doctrine. These will all be studied in a verse-by-verse study.

335 Jude

1 credit hour

A Study of the Book of Jude. This is a verse-by-verse study of this book and will help in seeing the nature of apostates, God's wrath against apostates, the sins of the apostates, and the encouragement to a means to avoid apostasy.

403 Revelation

3 credit hours

The study of symbols, figures, and signs, which appear in Old Testament prophecy, will be compared with those in **Revelation**.

- * The practical value of the book will be given.
- * The victory of Christ over every foe, which comes against Him, will be stressed.
- * All views will be considered.

PRACTICAL

109 Personal Evangelism

3 credit hours

This course will be instructing the student in how to win souls. Field study in residence work will be available. Students will be taught how to approach, create interest, answer objections, and lead to a decision.

110 Homiletics

3 credit hours

This course covers how to prepare and deliver an oral address to men from God's Word. Topical and expository delivery will be emphasized. *This course is for men only.*

333 Calibrate

1 credit hour

This study will provide helps in how to align your life to Christ.

334 Take the 90 Days with Jesus Challenge

1 credit hour

A group study lesson plan that goes through the four Gospels in 90 days.

218 Leadership in the Local Church

2 credit hours

This course will cover Leadership in the local Church. It will cover Elders, Deacons, and Evangelist roles and the need for decisiveness and accepting criticism. *This course is for men only.*

112 Christian Evidences

3 credit hours

This is a specific study of the basis of **Christian faith**.

306 Apologetics

3 credit hours

A generic study of apology for "faith in the God of the **Bible**."

210 The Abused Texts

3 credit hours

This is a study showing texts that cause skeptics of the Bible to stumble, cause Christians to be perplexed, and that do not teach what we've always been told.

HISTORY

108 New Testament History

3 credit hours

This covers an in-depth study of the **Book of Acts**, chapter by chapter.

- * Work of the ascended Christ by His Spirit is shown.
- * A study of the conversions
- * Concentration on Church government
- * The zeal of the first Christians will be analyzed.

HISTORY

304 Church History I	4 credit hours

An in-depth study of demons from the Scriptures .	
321 Theology of Hades – Where are the Dead?	1 credit hour

A study of the doctrine of the Trinity, showing that the Deity of Christ and the Deity of the Holy Spirit are Spiritually true. This will refute the false doctrines on the subject held by other religious groups.	
328 Theology of Prayer	2 credit hours
Praying the Lord’s Model Prayer and Prayer Answered Guaranteed will greatly strengthen your prayer life.	
222 Theology of Prophecy	3 credit hours
This covers the Old Testament Prophecies concerning the promised Messiah and their fulfillment in Jesus.	
231 Theology of Marriage, Divorce, and Remarriage	1 credit hour
This is a new study on this relevant subject. Be prepared to learn that the Church has misunderstood this subject through the years. This is a must for preachers!	
518 Theology of Salvation - Soteriology	4 credit hours
This is a study of the doctrine of salvation.	
514 Theology of the Holy Spirit - Pneumatology	4 credit hours
This is a study of the Holy Spirit. His person, His work, His gifts and fruits will be studied.

519	Theology of Islam – The Truth About Islam	2 credit hours
A course which covers its origin, its doctrine, its practices, and the dangers of the Muslim religion. It is factual, but also an exposé of Islam. The subject is kindly handled.		
520	Theology of the Perseverance of the Saints	2 credit hours
Can The Saved Ever Perish? is an examination of the doctrine, "Once in Grace, Always in Grace."		
330	Theology of Women – Women in the Church	1 credit hour
A course that discusses the issues of the roles of women in the Church.		
331	Theology of Covenants – Understanding Covenant Relationships	1 credit hour
A study of the covenants from the Old Testament.		
214	Theology of the Sabbath - A Study of the Sabbath	1 credit hour

215	Theology of the Holy Days – The Holy Days of Israel Fulfilled in Christ	1 credit hour

327	Theology of Calvinism – Calvinism's Attack on the Character of God	1 credit hour
This course will show the great error of Calvinism, its origin, and its blasphemy. "TULIP" will be thoroughly explained and refuted.

517	Eschatology	4 credit hours
This is a study of the things to come, and an examination and refutation of Dispensationalism.		
319	Left Behind? I Hope So!	1 credit hour
This is examining the "Left Behind" series and what God has to say about it. It is a Biblical refutation of Premillennialism.		
417	"Q & A" About the End Times	3 credit hours
This course discusses the many questions that arise today and about what will happen in the End Times.		

LANGUAGES

405-A	Introduction to Greek	2 credit hours
An introductory course covering pronunciation of Greek words, ability to read Greek texts, memorization of the Greek alphabet and provide basic understanding of Greek grammar and a working vocabulary.		
405	Greek I	6 credit hours
Teaches one year of the basic of Greek grammar and vocabulary declensions by the reading of I John in the Greek New Testament . Within weeks you can read, teach, and preach from I John with authority, freshness, and insight, which the Greek text can give.		
410-R	Introduction to Hebrew	3 credit hours
An introductory course covering pronunciation of Hebrew words, ability to read Hebrew texts, memorization of the Hebrew alphabet and provide basic understanding of Hebrew grammar and a working vocabulary.

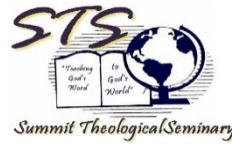
